What is Travel Training?

Travel training can be defined as a shortterm, intensive, individualized course of instruction designed to promote the independent travel of older adults and people with disabilities.

In West County, it is a seasonal program that includes a one-hour group workshop followed by a half-day outing used fixed route transit and local paratransit services




Characteristics of the WCCTAC Travel Training Program

- √ Seasonal
- ✓ Dedicated part time expert staff
- ✓ Partnerships with local agencies
- ✓ Requires adequate number of volunteers
- ✓ Maximum of four-hour outings
- ✓ Exciting well-planned destinations
- ✓ Bathroom locations

Background on Travel Training in West County



2016: MTC Workshop on Travel Training Regionwide

2017: Center for Independent Living 5310 grant: West County Train the Trainers

2018: Completed West County Accessible Transportation Study

March 2019: Travel Training Program rolled out



Travel Training constrained by COVID-19;

ATSP Completed / Measure X passed

May 2022

Mar. 2020 – Apr. 2022

Oct. 2023

Travel Training resumed in West County;

Countywide ATSP programs began using Measure X funds

2023 Travel Training Season

May 2023 - September 2023



- City of Hercules actively engaged
- Training TT peers County and CCTA 511 staff
- Engaged MTC staff regionwide efforts and future pilots
- Focus on creating the San Pablo Martinez Medical Trip Shuttle
- Limited participation from R-Transit program



2023 Travel Training Season

- Travel Training Kick-Off
- Travel Training Workshops
- Travel Training Outings
- Volunteer Corps Development

- May 2023
- 3 (61 participants)
- 4 (55 participants)
- 1 (11 participants)



Five Year Performance Overview

Number of Workshops:	26	
Number of Outings:	21	
Number of participants:	535	
Number of Volunteers:	11	
Number of Senior Clipper cards issued: over 100		

Key Lessons Learned

Unmet demand for Travel Training throughout the county;

Partnerships with local city and transit programs are essential;

Volunteers are extremely helpful with outings;

Fixed route outings were the focus but ADA paratransit, TNC options and medical center shuttles can be explored;

Issuing Senior Clipper cards is a huge plus

Key Lessons Learned - continued

This is a labor-intensive program, but low cost compared to some other transportation outreach efforts;

Our seniors do not use apps/smart phone as much as the general population or more affluent seniors;

Pre and post surveys participants feel safer, more confident and want to take additional trips;

Suburban users less transit savvy; San Pablo, Richmond and AC Transit/BART services more familiar

Possible Funding Sources:

County's Measure X
Pilot Program funds from MTC

Next Steps

CCTA and WCCTAC coordinate efforts to continue offering travel training

Possibly establish a countywide Travel Training program serving a greater number of senior and disabled residents

Identify Funding Sources - Measure X and Measure J

Possibly a year-round program
