

## Overview of the "North Richmond Green Streets Corridor Project, its benefits, and potential sources of funding

The North Richmond Green Streets Corridor (Project) is a proposed regional "sustainable streets" project with multiple uses/benefits, including as a series of designated bicycle and pedestrian routes across North Richmond, providing connections with San Pablo and Richmond and to the Bay Trail at two staging areas. The Project is already part of the Countywide Bike/Ped Plan and is included in the Contra Costa County Green Infrastructure Plan (2019). Furthermore, it will provide greater access to nature by including green infrastructure for stormwater treatment, as well as greater access to San Pablo Creek and the Bay Trail at two staging areas. In addition, it will serve to improve water quality benefits to both San Pablo and Wildcat Creeks. In addition, it will markedly improve non-motorized access within a designated disadvantaged community (DAC).

The proposed Project will serve to build upon and extend the results of the award-winning, recently completed <u>North Richmond Watershed Connections</u>, a multi-benefit and partnership-based GI, urban greening, and place making project that was funded by a \$1 million State Coastal Conservancy grant in conjunction with a comparable 1<sup>st</sup> mile/last mile grant.

This proposed Project has already been reviewed and vetted by The Watershed Project, who Included this corridor in its extensive public outreach for the "IRWM Watershed Resources Assessment" for North Richmond that was completed in 2022. It has also received staff review by the East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD) Trails Team, and by the members of the North Richmond Horizontal Levee Task Force and included in its planning and design process. The Project would be led by the County's Department of Conservation and Development – Transportation Planning staff and/or the Transportation Engineering Division of the Contra Costa County Public Works Department and will be supported by the County Watershed Program in either case.

The North Richmond Green Streets Corridor consists of 4 segments (as shown in Figures 1 and 2):

- Segment 1 Parr Boulevard / alt. 1A (San Pablo Creek access road) + Parr Boulevard. From the Bay Trail Staging Area at the West County Transfer Facility to Fred Jackson Way
- Segment 2 Fred Jackson Way (FJW). From Parr Boulevard to Market Avenue), which is a constructed
  portion of the North Richmond Watershed Connections Project and thus is already functioning as a
  completed Green Street
- **Segment 3 Market Avenue**. From Fred Jackson Way to the new Rumrill Boulevard "Green Street," which connects to the Wildcat Creek Trail, where it resumes east of Rumrill Blvd..
- Segment 4 Goodrick Avenue . From Parr Boulevard to Dotson Marsh (Segments 4a and 4b)
- **Pittsburg Avenue.** From the Richmond Parkway to FJW, if and when the North Richmond Horizontal Levee project is undertaken.

The North Richmond Green Streets Corridor Project benefits include the following:

- Serves North Richmond, a significant Disadvantaged Community (DAC)
- Is in County Stormwater Resources Plan and Green Infrastructure Plan; would serve to treat "Old Urban" and "Old Industrial" TMDLs
- Expands upon and connects to the *North Richmond Watershed Connections*, a recently funded and awardwinning project.
- Functions as a *regional project* in providing green infrastructure and by connecting residents of North Richmond, San Pablo, and Richmond to two staging areas of the Bay Trail (i.e., at the West County Transfer Station and at EBRPD's Dotson Marsh

- Will include multiple partnerships among them, The Watershed Project, Urban Tilth, the Cities of San Pablo and Richmond, the West County Wastewater District, and the EBRPD.
- Access to Bay Trail and connections to 2 parks in North Richmond, as well as with the new Rumrill Green Street and Wildcat Creek Trail.
- Provides a greenway-like experience parallel to Wildcat and San Pablo Creeks
- Segments are included in the Countywide Bike/Ped Plan
- Segments are also included in the County Transportation Engineering "CRIPP" (capital improvements program) for the North Richmond "Area of Benefit."
- Has been identified as a supportive project for the North Richmond Horizontal Levee Project, a multi-benefit and
  partner project being led by the West County Wastewater District that would establish the Bay Trail on a
  horizontal levee in this Project would provide access to it at three staging areas or points: Pittsburg Avenue; Parr
  Boulevard; and Goodrick Avenue.

**Potential sources of grant funding** for which the County Watershed Program has already received support from relevant agency staff to submit proposals for this Project:

- <u>San Francisco Bay Water Quality Improvement Fund</u>. (following consultation with Luisa Valiela, director of SF Bay WQ Improvement fund)
- <u>California Resources Agency Urban Greening Program Grant</u>. (the State Coastal Conservancy Bay Area Program staff reviewed this project and recommend it as a good candidate for it)
- Caltrans Alternative Compliance Funding for Green Infrastructure Projects, administered by Caltrans District 4. (Brian Rowley, who manages these funds on behalf of Caltrans District 4, previously worked for Geosyntec, and identified this project as highly suitable for these funds)

### Requirements and Preferences of the California Water Board for this solicitation

A. Eligibility: 1) meant for implementation (construction) and design/build projects; 2) Agencies with Stormwater Resource Plans; + nonprofit organizations; AND 3) Projects that treat and/or use a step with a variety of benefits (FC, environmental, community, etc.)

B. Project Preferences of the Regional Water Quality Control Board and of the EPA that the Project would serve:

- Provides benefits to a disadvantaged community (DAC)
- Demonstrates readiness to proceed
- Includes public outreach
- Includes cost benefit and water supply/quality as primary benefit
- Includes multiple uses/benefits including as green infrastructure
- Demonstrates nature-based project elements, e.g. green spaces

Proposed Project Funding Concept: Contra Costa County and its partners will be seeking design/build funding from the noted grant sources and perhaps others, to be determined, for Segments 1, 3, and 4 of the Project. Segment 2 (between Parr and Market Avenue) has already been completed as part of the North Richmond Watershed Connections.

### WCCTAC FISCAL YEAR 2024-25 DRAFT WORK PROGRAM

WCCTAC's activities may be grouped into the following five major areas: Planning and Programming (General Operations), Special Projects, Transportation Demand Management (TDM), Sub-regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program (STMP), and Office Administration.

#### Planning and Programming (General Operations)

This program area relates to WCCTAC's function as the Regional Transportation Planning Committee (RTPC) for West Contra Costa County under Measure J. It also includes transportation planning efforts resulting from the agency's Joint Powers Agency function. Activities in this program area are mainly funded with annual member agency contributions and, to a smaller extent, Measure J dollars.

#### MEASURE J PROGRAMMING

- 1. Program and administer West County's Measure J projects and programs, including:
  - a. Low Income Student Bus Pass Program (Measure J 21b)
  - b. Additional Bus Transit Enhancements (Measure J 19b)
  - c. Transportation for Seniors and People with Disabilities (Measure J 15b, 20b)
  - d. Sub-regional needs (Measure J 28b)

### COUNTY-WIDE AND REGIONAL PLANNING AND FUNDING

- 2. Work with CCTA on the development of the Countywide Transportation Plan.
- 3. Work with the CCTA and WCCTAC member agencies on the development of new and updated Community-based Transportation Plans in West Contra Costa County.
- 4. Work with Contra Costa County Public Works on its Vision Zero Technical Advisory Committee.
- Monitor Action Plan compliance by reviewing certain proposed projects, General Plans or Amendments, and work to advance goals, objectives and actions contained in the West County Action Plan.
- Partner with CCTA on the development of training sessions to assist local jurisdictional staff with Growth Management Program checklist compliance.
- 7. Participate in regional, countywide, sub-regional, and local efforts related to planning, funding, and delivery of priority capital projects in West County.
- 8. Monitor the Link21 effort to improve and coordinate the regional rail network in Northern California and provide input as needed.

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- 9. Monitor and keep the TAC and Board informed about SB 1031 and the details of a potential regional funding measure.
- 10. Find opportunities to advocate for transit funding to support existing services.

- 13.\_15. Continue to monitor and participate in MTC's implementation of HOV lanes on I-580. This work also includes modifications at the westbound Richmond Parkway off-ramp.
- 14.16. Continue to monitor and participate in MTC's implementation of open-tolling on the east end of the Richmond-San Rafael Bridge.
- <u>15.17.</u> Continue to monitor and participate, if possible, in MTC, BATA and Caltrans analysis and recommendations for the westbound shoulder of the Richmond-San Rafael Bridge.

Based on the 2015 Cooperative Agreement, participate with WETA, CCTA and Richmond on <a href="mailto:the-annual review">the</a> Richmond ferry's ridership, <a href="mailto:service levels">service levels</a>, marketing, fare policy, access issues, and capital needs. <a href="Meep the TAC">Keep the TAC</a> and Board informed about Richmond Ferry service considerations. <a href="Meep the TAC">Keep the TAC</a> and Board informed about CCTA ferry expansion studies, especially as it relates to Hercules.
- 24.26. Monitor plans for and construction of transit-oriented development and supporting access improvements at both El Cerrito BART Stations and work with BART and El Cerrito.
- 27. Work with CCTA, AC Transit and the cities of El Cerrito, Richmond (and keep San Pablo informed) -potentially San Pablo to about the development of a scope of work for Phase 3 of the San Pablo Avenue Multimodal Corridor Study which focuses on outreach to businesses and community members to advance the concepts identified in Phase 2.
- 25.28. Explore the creation of a Transportation Management Association (TMA) with El Cerrito, Richmond, and BART.

#### **FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES**

- 26.29. Monitor grant opportunities, inform member agencies, assist member agencies with their grant applications, provide letters of support, and facilitate prioritization of West County candidate projects for grants. Some examples of grant opportunities include Active Transportation Infrastructure Investment Program (ATIIP) which focuses on building networks of connected bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure improvements, Active Transportation Program (ATP) grants for pedestrian and bicycle improvements, Program for Arterial System Synchronization (PASS) for adjusting signal timing, as well as federal 5310 grants for senior and disabled transportation.
- 27.30. Finalize the selection of a consultant bench to assist WCCTAC staff with

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preparing grant applications.

- 28.31. Monitor and apply as appropriate for Regional Measure 3 funds for Richmond Parkway and San Pablo Avenue projects.
- 29-32. Advocate for the inclusion of planned West County transportation projects in future funding measures (e.g., Bay-Area and County-wide).
- 30.33. Seek funding to advance and implement the projects recommended in Phase 2 of the San Pablo Avenue Multimodal Corridor Study with CCTA and ACTC and local jurisdictions.
- 31.34. Take the lead in applying for grants for planning and implementation of multijurisdictional improvements, in partnership with member agencies.

#### **FORMAL BODIES**

32.35. Manage or participate in meetings of the: WCCTAC Board, WCCTAC TAC, CCTA Board, CCTA Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (CBPAC), CCTA Administration and Projects Committee (APC), CCTA Paratransit Coordinating Committee (PCC), the Active Transportation Specific Plan (ATSP) Task Force, the West County Mobility Management Group, the West County Senior Coalition, CCTA Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC), CCTA Growth Management Task Force, and the Caltrans District 4 Pedestrian Advisory Committee.

#### **Special Projects**

As a Joint Powers Agency, WCCTAC may apply for and receive various grants that advance the transportation goals of West Contra Costa. WCCTAC can also serve as a lead for certain studies or projects using other agency contributions. In the upcoming fiscal year, WCCTAC will:

- Subject to staffing considerations and funding availability, mManage the Travel
  Training Program funded by Measure J 28b. This will involve teaching groups and
  individuals to use fixed route transit (BART, buses, ferry), ADA and non-ADA
  paratransit, and other mobility services. Explore other funding sources for the
  program
- 2. Finalize the Caltrans-funded, draft Richmond Parkway Transportation Plan, also known as the Richmond Parkway Environmental Justice and Regional Mobility Plan.

# **Transportation Demand Management (TDM)**

This program promotes transportation alternatives to the single occupant vehicle by encouraging walking, bicycling, transit, carpooling, and vanpooling, and is coordinated with the larger countywide 511 Contra Costa Program. It is funded on a reimbursement basis by Measure J and grants from the Air District.

Currently, CCTA is working to amend the policies and procedures for disbursing TFCA funds for TDM. The CCTA may also modify focus areas in the TDM program to put more emphasis on reducing VMT. The following section of the workplan is subject to change and may depend on funding availability. Additionally, WCCTAC may deliver some of these activities in conjunction with CCTA and potentially with the support of CCTA's on-call consultant team.

In the upcoming fiscal year, the TDM program will:

- Manage the Employer-Based Trip Reduction Program, which includes employer outreach and programs, tabling at community events, transit incentives, funding for bike racks and lockers, funding for EV charging stations.
- 2. Manage the West County "Pass2Class" program that provides free transit passes to students at the beginning of the school year.
- 3. Manage the Commuter Benefit program, which includes the countywide programs Guaranteed Ride Home, Try Transit, Take 10, and Secure Your Cycle Programs.
- 4. Co-lead Bike to Wherever Days 2025 with other regional partners.
- 5. Support Local Agency Climate Action plans and efforts that aim to improve access to bicycling, pedestrian facilities, transit, and emerging mobility technology such as shared bicycles and cars, electric bicycles, scooters, and autonomous vehicles.
- 6. Continue to implement strategy to encourage telework/work from home policies and flexible work hour policies with Contra Costa Employers.
- 7.6. Assist in the promotion of the new City of Richmond e-shuttle service that allows students and seniors to ride for free.
- 8. Implement bicycle and pedestrian improvements at Del Norte BART station, using repurposed Air District funds
- 9-7. Implement the Summer Youth Pass program, which provides discounted bus passes for youth during summer months.

### Sub-regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program (STMP)

WCCTAC acts as the trustee for the development impact fees collected by the West County cities and the unincorporated areas of the County. An updated program went into effect on July 1, 2019. Under the updated program, STMP funds are to be used for twenty pre-identified, regionally benefitting capital projects. In the upcoming fiscal year, WCCTAC will:

1. Collect, administer, and track funds and reporting forms.

- 2. Provide monitoring reports on revenue collected and status of local reporting.
- 3. Develop funding agreements with project sponsors for any Board-approved funding allocations.
- 4. Manage calls for projects based on Board direction, and allocate funds to eligible, Board-approved projects.
- 5. Respond to inquiries from local agencies and members of the public.
- 6. Review and process appeal and exemption requests.
- 7. Monitor and update, as needed, the expiration dates of existing STMP funding agreements.
- Complete the required five-year review and update of the 2019 STMP and its nexus study.
- 8-9. Develop a detailed schedule for the replacement of the 2019 STMP Next Study, and draft an RFP for consultant support.

**Administration** 

In the upcoming fiscal year, staff will:

- Complete an remaining activities related to the the implementation process for of WCCTAC's new transition to "Doing Business As" name: the West Contra Costa Transportation Commission.
- 2. Maintain, update, and expand content on the agency's website.
- 3. Continually evaluate work and meeting practices, post Covid.
- 4. Complete digitizing and organizing WCCTAC records including funding agreements, resolutions, minutes, and Board and TAC meeting packets.
- 5. Continue implementation of invoice tracking system.
- 6. Explore office options and/or prepare for lease renewal.
- Complete approval process for the 2023 amendments to the Joint Powers Agreement, and assist jurisdictions with this effort, as needed.

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
