- 9. Amendment to Consulting Services Agreement with Fehr and Peers for the 2019 STMP Nexus Study Update and Authorization to Use STMP Funds. On April 4, 2017, WCCTAC executed a contract with Fehr and Peers for the STMP Update. The contract budget amount was \$248,710 with a not-to-exceed amount of \$250,000. Given the need for Fehr and Peers to participate in more council and board meetings than expected, the consultants' expenses are projected to slightly exceed the budget. This contract amendment would raise the not-to-exceed budget to \$254,610. Resolution No. 19-04 would direct the WCCTAC Executive Director to execute the amendment and would stipulate that an additional \$4,610 in STMP funds would be used for the additional expenses. (Attachments, Recommend Action: Approve Resolution No. 19-04 authorizing the Executive Director to execute an Amendment to the Consultant Services Agreement and authorizing the use of \$4,610 of STMP revenue for the additional consultant services).
- 10. Amendment to Cooperative Funding Agreement with BART providing STMP funding for El Cerrito Del Norte Station Modernization Project. At its December 14, 2018 meeting, the WCCTAC Board authorized an additional allocation of \$500,000 in Sub-regional Transportation Mitigation Program (STMP) funds to BART for the El Cerrito Del Norte Station Modernization Project. Since a previously approved cooperative agreement provided \$1,000,000 to the same project, this new allocation only requires an amendment to the original agreement. (Attachment; Recommended Action: Adopt Resolution 19-05 authorizing the Executive Director to execute an Amendment to the Cooperative Agreement).
- 11. City of Richmond's Measure J 20b Claims for FY 17-18. Measure J 20b is the Additional Transportation for Senior and People with Disabilities funding category. The cities of El Cerrito, Richmond, and San Pablo, as well as the transit operators, are eligible for these funds. In FY 17-18, the City of Richmond revamped its R-Transit program and asked WCCTAC staff to hold off on processing claims for funding until the City implements a new model for delivering non-ADA services. At this time, Richmond has submitted a claim form for FY 17-18. The CCTA Paratransit Coordinating Committee (PCC) has approved this funding claim, with the caveat that the PCC needs to see more progress before approving FY 18-19 funds or any future funds. WCCTAC staff concurs with the PCC and recommends that the WCCTAC Board approve the 20b funds for FY 17-18. (Attachment, Recommend Action: Approve FY17-18 Claim).

- Plan Bay Area 2050 Project List for West County. MTC recently initiated development for the next Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), which will be known as Plan Bay Area 2050. As a result, CCTA is working with Regional Transportation Planning Committees (RTPCs) like WCCTAC to develop a project list for Contra Costa County. The list is constrained by the amount of funds projected to be available during the next 30 years. It also includes a "Vision" list which is financially unconstrained. Lastly, the RTP includes numerous programmatic categories that are broad. Projects that fall into these categories do not need to be listed individually. The WCCTAC TAC, with input from Authority staff, has developed a proposed list for the Board's consideration. (Hisham Noeimi CCTA staff; John Nemeth WCCTAC staff, Attachment; Recommended Action: Approve Project List recommended by the WCCTAC TAC and forward to the CCTA).
- 13. New Transportation Expenditure Plan (TEP). At its February 2019 Board meeting, the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA) authorized staff to begin exploring development of a new TEP for a potential transportation sales tax measure. At its April 2019 Board meeting, CCTA staff outlined guiding principles, a work plan, and a schedule for the development of the TEP. Staff from CCTA or WCCTAC will provide an overview of the process and seek Board feedback on how WCCTAC can best engage with the TEP process. Pinole Hosts Transportation Town Hall Forum



State District 15 Assembly Member Buffy Wicks organized a public forum in Pinole on March 28th that focused on transportation issues in West Contra Costa and, in particular, the challenges and opportunities to improve traffic on the I-80 corridor. Panelists included Wicks and three WCCTAC Board Members, including: Chair Kelley, Vice-Chair Swearingen, and Director Simon. Executive Director, John Nemeth, also served on the panel.

Panelists touched on a number of issues including: the opportunities for expanding and improving the transit network in West County, recent and potential future modifications to Highway 101, the roles and responsibilities of large employers, and the relationship between housing and long commutes.

Status of the 2019 STMP Update

WCCTAC staff and its consulting team have been making the rounds to local Council and Board meetings of West County jurisdictions to present and seek approval of the 2019 STMP Update. Each jurisdiction must agendize the item at least twice in order to pass a local ordinance. To date, San Pablo, El Cerrito, and Pinole have held both meetings and fully approved the 2019 STMP Update. The Cities of Hercules and Richmond, as well as the County, are scheduled to have second readings.

Better Transportation on San Pablo Ave. in El Cerrito, Richmond and San Pablo

On May 14 at 7:00 pm, the City of El Cerrito's Environmental Quality Committee is hosting a forum at the El Cerrito City Hall (10890 San Pablo Avenue, cross street Manila Ave., El Cerrito). The forum will allow all West County residents to learn about and provide feedback on what the future could hold for San Pablo Ave. (SPA).

The SPA Multimodal Corridor Study is developing scenarios for improving transit, pedestrian, and bicycle access and safety along San Pablo Avenue between downtown Oakland and Hilltop. The study seeks to identify a coordinated network of transportation facilities along the length of the street to serve SPA's existing and future users.

All who work, live, or travel through West County, are invited to discuss potential ideas for the future and give feedback. There is also an online survey at https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/SPACorridor to view proposed options. This study is funded by WCCTAC, the Alameda County Transportation Commission (ACTC) and the Contra Costa Transportation Authority.

West County Express Bus Outreach – Round 2

WCCTAC's High Capacity Transit Study recommended developing additional express bus service between West County and West Berkeley, Emeryville, Oakland, and San Francisco. WCCTAC received a state grant (SB1) and has been working with AC Transit, WestCAT, and a team of consultants to develop possible new express bus routes as part of the Express Bus Implementation Plan. After collecting information on where people live and work and their travel habits, the teams has developed an array of possible new express bus routes. These are now being shared with the public. The purpose of the outreach is to learn which routes would be most popular, which need to be tweaked, and which may be of a lower priority. During late April-June, the public can provide feedback through an outline tool. The public will be engaged through e-blasts, local jurisdictions' outreach tools, pop-up events, and employer focus groups. Dismissal of Lawsuit Allows Bay Area Bridge Toll Funds for Transportation Upgrades

"A San Francisco Superior Court judge has tossed a lawsuit filed last year to block the use of voter-approved toll increases on the Bay Area's state-owned bridges to pay for regional transportation and public transit upgrades, paving the way for \$4.5 billion in projects to move ahead.

Judge Ethan P. Schulman dismissed the suit filed in July against the Bay Area Toll Authority and California Legislature by the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association.

Voters in June passed Regional Measure 3 with 55% support across the nine counties. As a result, the first of three \$1 toll hikes went into effect on Jan. 1 on each of the region's bridges except the independently operated Golden Gate Bridge, with subsequent increases set for 2022 and 2025.

The Bay Area Toll Authority now awaits the judge's official filing in the coming days before the full Metropolitan Transportation Commission settles on a process for disbursing toll money to road and transit projects."

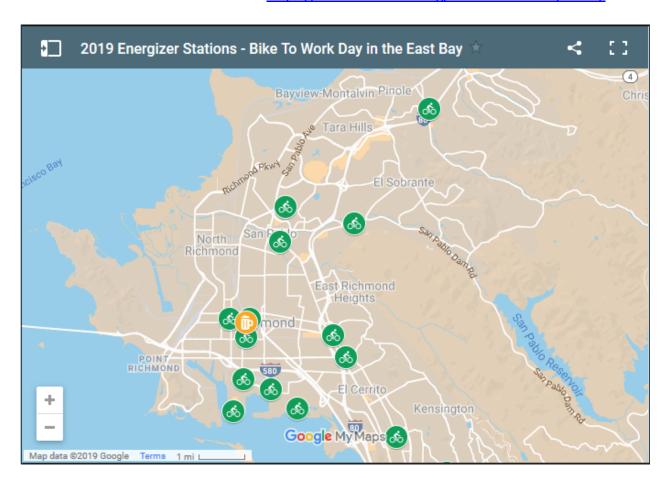

Re: Transportation Impact Mitigation Fee Programs: Encouragement of Accessory Dwelling Units

Dear Chair Kelly,

On behalf of the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors, I am writing to make you aware of an effort initiated at the County to address the housing crisis. At our April 9th Board meeting, we considered a report discussing transportation impact fee programs and how accessory dwelling units (ADUs) are assessed. ADUs have the potential to increase housing affordability, create a broader range of housing types, and leverage existing infrastructure investments.

In this light, the Board recommended initiating a process to work towards exempting ADUs from transportation impact fees. This exemption would help to encourage their production. As with all Contra Costa jurisdictions, the County imposes both local and regional transportation impact fees consistent with our Measure J Growth Management Program (GMP). For the local fee programs the County is developing an ordinance to make this exemption consistent across the programs we maintain for the various unincorporated areas.

For the GMP related fee programs we are approaching each Regional Transportation Planning Committee and seeking common ground on acceptable approaches to similarly exempt and encourage ADUs.

The County supports the exemption in the new model fee ordinance developed by WCCTAC ("...accessory dwelling units within the footprint of an existing dwelling unit's habitable space are not required to pay the STMP Fee."), the language was approved at our April 16th Board of Supervisors meeting. The County would like WCCTAC to consider broadening the ADU exemption.

RE: Appointments to the CCTA's Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC)

REQUESTED ACTIONS

Re-appoint Yvetteh Ortiz of El Cerrito staff, and Leah Greenblat of WCCTAC staff, to serve on the CCTA's Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC) representing WCCTAC for a two-year term.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The TCC provides advice on technical matters that may come before the Authority. The Committee members also act as the technical liaison between the Authority and the Regional Transportation Planning Committees (RTPCs). The TCC reviews and comments on draft plans, grant guidelines, and selection criteria for some funding sources. The TCC is composed of an array of technical staff members.

Each RTPC appoints three members representing the planning, engineering, and transportation disciplines. RTPCs can also appoint alternates. Other representatives are drawn from transit operators, the City-County Engineers, Caltrans, MTC and the Bay Area Air Quality Management District.

WCCTAC's current representatives are Yvetteh Ortiz (El Cerrito) and Leah Greenblat (WCCTAC staff). The CCTA notified WCCTAC that their terms expired on March 31, 2019. The third WCCTAC representative is Jill Mercurio (San Pablo) who was appointed by the Board at its March meeting to fill a vacancy. At that time, Mike Roberts (Hercules) was appointed as an alternate.

The WCCTAC TAC discussed the two appointments at its April 11, 2019 meeting and unanimously recommended the re-appointment of Ms. Ortiz and Ms. Greenblat.

RE: Amendment to Consulting Services Agreement with Fehr and Peers for the

2019 STMP Nexus Study Update and Authorization to Use STMP Funds

REQUESTED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 2019-04 that, 1) authorizes the WCCTAC Executive Director to sign Amendment #1 with Fehr and Peers to modify the consultant services agreement for the 2019 STMP Update to increase the amount of total compensation by \$4,610 for a total compensation not to exceed \$254,610 for additional services; and 2) authorizes the use of \$4,610 in STMP funds for the additional services.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Following Board authorization, in April 2017, WCCTAC entered into a consulting services agreement with Fehr and Peers for the 2019 STMP Update. The consultant agreement was for \$248,710 with a not to exceed amount of \$250,000. The scope of work called for the Consultant to provide six presentations related to the 2019 STMP Update to the governing boards of the six local jurisdictions.

During the 2019 STMP Update process, the Consultant completed some work tasks under budget and, prior to formal presentations to local jurisdictions, the Update was projected to be completed slightly under budget.

As the adoption process progressed, however, there were questions and concerns that necessitated the Consultant attending three additional meetings, beyond what was originally scoped. These meetings included: the Contra Costa Board of Supervisors on March 26; the City of Pinole on April 2, and the City of Hercules on April 9. The total cost of these additional meetings was \$5,900, an amount reviewed and accepted by staff.

Although the WCCTAC Executive Director is generally authorized to make expenditures under \$10,000 without Board approval, WCCTAC's counsel does not interpret this authority as extending to contract limits. As a result, the Executive Director requested the additional meetings, but notified Fehr and Peers in advance that they could only be compensated for those meetings through an amendment to their contract. Fehr and Peers attended the additional meetings.

Although the cost for additional services is \$5,900, the proposed contract amendment would only raise the not to exceed amount by \$4,610 to \$254,610. This is due to the Consultant's original proposal being \$1,290 less than the agreement's \$250,000 limit.

WHEREAS, WCCTAC staff and Fehr and Peers staff have prepared an amendment to the Consultant Services Agreement to provide for additional necessary services to support local jurisdictions during the review and adoption process for the 2019 STMP Update; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of WCCTAC desires to approve the amendment to the Consultant Services Agreement and authorize the use of additional STMP funds to pay for the additional services provided by Fehr and Peers.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the West Contra Costa Transportation Advisory Committee:

1. Does hereby authorize the additional allocation of \$4,610 in STMP funds for Fehr and Peers' consulting services in order to fund the cost of services related to attending three additional out of scope public meetings and authorizes the amendment to the Consultant Services Agreement to increase the total compensation in an additional amount of \$4,610 attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Exhibit A.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO THE CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE WEST CONTRA COSTA TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE AND FEHR AND PEERS

This First Amendment to Consulting Services Agreement, dated April 7, 2017, between the West Contra Costa Transportation Advisory Committee, a Joint Powers Agency existing under the laws of the State of California, ("WCCTAC") and Fehr and Peers, a corporation, with offices located at 100 Pringle Avenue, Walnut Creek, CA 94596, ("Consultant") (together sometimes referred to as "Parties") is entered into as of the date executed below.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Parties executed a Consulting Services Agreement (the "Agreement"), dated April 7, 2017, to prepare a nexus fee update and strategic expenditure plan for the Subregional Transportation Mitigation Program (the "Services"); and

WHEREAS, following execution of the Agreement, the Parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide for additional necessary services to support local jurisdictions during the review and adoption process for the 2019 STMP Update; and

WHEREAS, the Parties original agreement included a consultant budget of \$248,710 with a not to exceed limit of \$250,000; and

WHEREAS, the 2019 STMP Update as of March 2019 was on target to be completed on budget for \$248,710;

WHEREAS, the cost of the additional services beyond the consultant budget of \$248,710 is \$5,900, and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide Consultant with the additional compensation necessary to complete the Services; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Director is authorized to execute this Amendment in a form approved by the General Counsel.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Section 2, Compensation, of the Agreement, shall be modified to increase the amount of total compensation by four thousand six hundred and ten dollars (\$4,610) for a total compensation not to exceed two hundred fifty-four thousand six hundred and ten dollars, (\$254,610).

Dear Leah:

It has a been a pleasure working with you on the Subregional Transportation Mitigation Program (STMP) nexus update. As you are aware, the technical work involved in the nexus update has been completed and the final report has been submitted and accepted by the WCCTAC Board. For the past few months we have been involved in the fee adoption process.

Our original scope of work for the adoption process included attendance at six meetings, one with each of the governing boards of the six local jurisdictions, to present the results of the nexus study and answer questions. To date, we have made those formal presentations to four of the jurisdictions: San Pablo, El Cerrito, Hercules, and Pinole. Presentations are yet to be given at Richmond and Contra Costa County and are included in our original scope.

As the adoption process has progressed, unanticipated questions have arisen in some jurisdictions and you have requested that we attend additional meetings beyond what was originally scoped. The following are the additional meetings that we have already attended or are expecting to attend shortly, along with the cost associated with preparing for and attending those meetings:

- March 26, Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors: to address questions related to Accessory Dwelling Units (\$1,300)
- April 2, City of Pinole: to be attended by both Fehr & Peers and Urban Economics to give a new presentation that addresses questions related to economic impacts of fees (\$2,800)
- April 9, City of Hercules: to follow up on original presentation and address questions related to fee amounts (\$1,800)

The total additional cost associated with these meetings is \$5,900. Note that there is also going to be an April 9 meeting at the County Board of Supervisors where the STMP will be discussed; at

this point we are assuming that WCCTAC staff only will be attending that meeting so we have not included it in the list above.

Please let me know if you need any further information from us in order to process a budget amendment for this additional effort. Thank you again for the opportunity to work with you on this study.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of WCCTAC desires to approve the amendment to the Cooperative Agreement.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO THE COOPERATIVE FUNDING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE WEST CONTRA COSTA TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE AND SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT FOR THE EL CERRITO DEL NORTE MODERNIZATION PROJECT

This First Amendment to the Cooperative Funding Agreement, dated December 28, 2017, between the West Contra Costa Transportation Advisory Committee, a Joint Powers Agency existing under the laws of the State of California, ("WCCTAC") and San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit District ("BART"), a rapid transit district established pursuant to California Public Utilities Code Section 28500 et seq. (together sometimes referred to as "Parties") is entered into as of the date executed below.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Parties executed a Cooperative Funding Agreement (the "Agreement"), dated December 28, 2017, to appropriate One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) in 2006 Subregional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program ("STMP") funds to BART for use towards BART's El Cerrito Del Norte Modernization Project (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, at its December, 14, 2018 meeting, the WCCTAC Board of Directors approved an additional Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) in STMP funds for a total of One Million and Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) in STMP funds to BART for use towards the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide BART with the additional STMP funds authorized by the WCCTAC Board of Directors and make a modification to reflect the appropriate BART contact; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Director is authorized to execute this Amendment in a form approved by the General Counsel.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Section 2.1, Funding, of the Agreement, shall be modified to increase the amount of STMP funds to the Project by Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) for a total funding amount under this agreement not to exceed One Million and Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000).
- 2. Section 3.7, Notices, of the Agreement is amended to change the BART contact from Nikki Foletta to Aileen Hernandez.
- 3. With the exception of the foregoing, all other terms and conditions in the Agreement, as amended, remain in force and effect.

RE: City of Richmond's Measure J 20b Claim for FY 17-18

REQUESTED ACTION

Approve \$242,939 in Measure J, 20b (Additional Transportation for Seniors and People with Disabilities) funds for Fiscal Year 17-18.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Measure J Program 20b, Additional Transportation for Seniors and People with Disabilities, provides funding to the five West County paratransit operators (East Bay Paratransit Consortium (EBPC), El Cerrito, San Pablo, and WestCAT) for services to supplement those provided under the Countywide Measure J Program 15, Transportation for Seniors and People with Disabilities. The programming and allocation of Program 15 funds are handled by CCTA, while WCCTAC approves Program 20b funds for West County operators.

The chart below shows the status of Program 15 and Program 20b funding to the City of Richmond:

The City of Richmond is currently restructuring its R-Transit program for seniors and people with disabilities. The former City Manager asked that the Measure J funds be put on hold until the City could address some concerns with the program. Some of these concerns were discussed at the Richmond City Council, including a high cost per trip and high rate of driver injuries.

The WCCTAC 2018 Accessible Transportation Needs Study, conducted by WCCTAC and its consultant Nelson Nygaard, reviewed Measure J funded programs in West County. The Study identified issues with the City's program that included: low ridership levels, a high cost per trip, a lack of service in unincorporated areas (and lack of program awareness in unincorporated areas), and a desire for service to the Martinez area medical services such as the County Hospital and Veterans Hospital.

Simultaneously, MTC and Caltrans audited the City's vehicles acquired under the Caltrans Section 5310 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Program, and found that the vehicles were not being properly managed and maintained. At this time, per communication with MTC, Caltrans is preparing to reclaim all but two of the City's nine vehicles. At present the City employs two drivers.

For the past three years, the City Council, WCCTAC staff, the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA), and Contra Costa County have been providing feedback to the City to help create more effective service to meet the growing needs of residents in both the City and unincorporated West County. This has included several meetings with the current and former Richmond City Manager over the last few years.

These discussions, and City Council direction, led to staff exploring a Lyft contract for eligible ambulatory clients, while retaining a smaller wheelchair accessible program for eligible disabled clients. As of today, the City staff has verbally shared various scenarios but many of details are still in flux. WCCTAC and CCTA staff met with the new City Manager and City staff on February 22, 2019 and outlined areas of concern. WCCTAC followed up with a very detailed and specific letter asking the City to address and provide clarification for areas of concern (see Attachment C). The City has expressed intent to formally respond. As of April 18, 2019, they have not yet responded.

On March 18, 2019, the Paratransit Coordinating Committee (PCC) which reviews all Program 15 and 20b claims raised concerns after hearing a presentation by the City staff. However, the PCC ultimately recommended that CCTA approve the allocation of Program 15 funds for FY 17-18 in recognition of the City's efforts to revamp its program. The PCC recommended that future claims for funding would require a more detailed budget and greater detail regarding program elements. The Authority approved the City's FY 17-18 Measure J 15 claim form on April 17, 2019.

Given the PCC and CCTA actions, WCCTAC staff recommends approval of the Measure J 20b portion of the FY 17-18 claims. Like the PCC, WCCTAC staff recommends that more program detail be provided prior to approval of any future claims. This detail will be described in a presentation to the WCCTAC Board.

Brief Paratransit System History

R-Transit (formerly Richmond Paratransit) began over 30 years ago as a small demonstration project. The program focuses on the transportation needs of persons with disabilities and seniors (ages 55 and older). Specifically, the program serves disabled persons and seniors residing in the one of the following Cities: Richmond, Kensington, El Sobrante, and the unincorporated communities of East Richmond Heights, Hasford Heights, Rollingwood, and North Richmond.

In 2014, the R-Transit program relocated to the R-Transit Center, a mobility management center in Contra Costa County where residents can learn about public transportation as well as Paratransit services within West Contra Costa and the surrounding Bay Area. Qualified persons can register for R-Transit service and receive help to sign up for the Contra Costa County nutrition program.

Types of Service

System Overview

R-Transit provides door-to-door demand response trips, group trips, senior nutrition program transportation services, and standing orders Monday-Friday from 8:30 am -5 pm. Reservations are required and can be made up to 10 days in advance. Same day service is based on availability.

All trips regardless of service are local within a service area that includes the Cities of El Cerrito, Richmond, and San Pablo as well as the unincorporated communities of Bayview-Montalvin, East Richmond Heights, El Sobrante, Hasford Heights, Kensington, North Richmond, Rollingwood and Tara Hills.

R-Transit staff manages the R-Transit Center where visitors can learn about various transportation options and programs. Seniors (age 55 and older), and disabled persons who meet the residency requirement can sign up for R-Transit service and learn about other programs that they qualify for such as the Senior Nutrition program and East Bay Paratransit. Interested applicants who do not meet the residency requirement for the R-Transit program can obtain information and applications to establish Paratransit service with Cities of El Cerrito and San Pablo. The Cities of El Cerrito, San Pablo, and Richmond meet bi-monthly to coordinate transportation services in West Contra Costa and to implement strategies in the Contra Costa Mobility Management Plan.

Driver Training

All R-Transit drivers receive regular training, such as but not limited to, lift-equipped vehicle usage, pre/post trip inspection, First Aid with CPR/AED, wheelchair tie downs, bloodborne pathogens, defensive driver training, and customer service.

Performance Monitoring

R-Transit is monitored on a quarterly basis for effectiveness based on the annual City Council approved performance measures. Customer satisfaction surveys are available online and in person. The responses are tabulated on a quarterly basis to assess overall performance.

Marketing

Outreach and marketing is ongoing with distribution of flyers, user guide, and applications are local events, community meetings, senior centers, and other locations throughout the R-Transit service area. In depth program information and application submission is available online at www.rtransit.com , over the phone, or in person at the R-Transit Center.

An attendant may ride with the participant at no additional charge. Guests are required to pay the same fare as the enrolled participant.

Group Trips

A group trip consists of five or more passengers with trips beginning and ending at designated locations. The cost is \$4.00 each way per passenger. Reservations are required and can be made online at www.rtransit.com, by phone, or by fax.

Senior Nutrition Program Transportation Services

R-Transit has an agreement with the Contra Costa County Senior Nutrition Program to provide transportation services at \$2.00 per trip per qualified participant.

Standing Orders

On a limited basis, standing orders are provided for clients who have medical treatment and employment obligations.

Unmet Paratransit Needs

R-Transit's door-to-door service provides pre-scheduled and same day reservation on a space available basis. The program strives to provide a similar level of service to mandated

ADA service. The program is designed to fill gaps that are not met by ADA-mandated providers and to relieve ADA mandated providers of some trips. Although R-Transit addresses numerous critical service needs, the following gaps still exist:

- Door-to-Door service to Veterans Affairs Medical Center & Contra Costa
 Regional Medical Center in Martinez.
 Seniors and disabled persons in the West Contra Costa County have expressed
 the need for a van/bus service to medical appointments and treatments in
 Martinez. Specifically a route which eliminates the need for multiple
 connections serving patrons from locations in Richmond, El Cerrito, and San
 Pablo.
- A wheelchair and scooter breakdown transportation service for wheelchair and scooter
 users that are stranded in West Contra Costa County due to a mechanical breakdown of
 their mobility device or a medical emergency that has separated them from their chair.
- A travel training program specifically designed to serve residents in the R-Transit service area to familiarize persons with disabilities and seniors on how to use fixed transit systems.

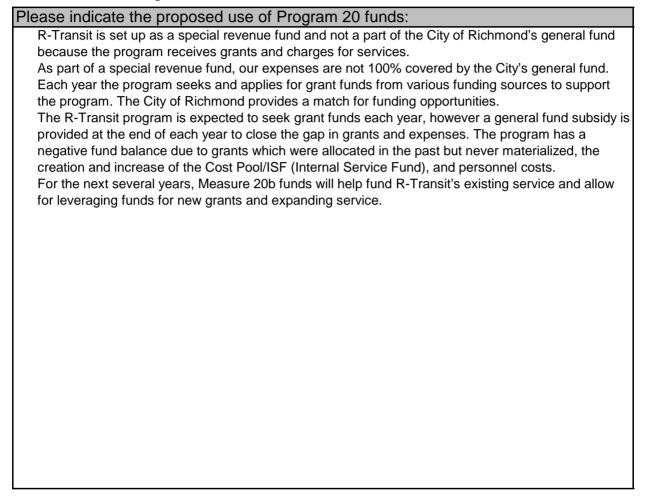

Thank you for arranging a meeting with the Richmond staff, including the City Manager, to discuss advancing Measure J funds to improve non-ADA paratransit services to residents in Richmond and the unincorporated areas of West County.

San Pablo

As discussed at the conclusion of our meeting, WCCTAC and CCTA staff agreed to send a letter to Richmond staff outlining areas of concern discussed at the meeting, and ways the City can address these concerns. Here is that letter. We have also included a timeline for releasing funds as well as the review process for getting the claim forms approved.

The following areas require more information from the City in its FY 2018-19 claim forms:

1. Van Fleet Status

<u>Current Status:</u> Caltrans did an on-site audit in the Fall of 2018 and identified issues regarding van maintenance and fleet size in relation to the number of drivers.

Information Needed: The City and Caltrans need to formalize how many vans will

remain with the City. WCCTAC and CCTA staffs recommend that the City obtain a letter from Caltrans confirming the number of vans that will remain with the City for the next five years. The number of vans and van drivers should be sufficient to cover the entire service area. Our understanding is there are currently two active van drivers. We were

not clear how many trips two drivers can provide in such a large service area.

replacement schedule, and define where the funds will come from to replace the
fleet when the remaining vans are no longer in service.

2. Accessing Lyft Trips

<u>Current Status</u>: Our understanding of the current Lyft program is that the City is providing information to residents on how they can obtain smartphones through a federal lifeline program. The City staff is then hosting workshops to teach the residents how to use their smartphones to arrange their own Lyft trips using a code issued to them by the City.

<u>Information Needed:</u> To conform to the spirit of Title VI (Civil Rights Act) legislation, the City should assure that any and all senior and disabled qualified residents in the service area can access a Lyft trip. This will mean going beyond the current approach and working to create a system that allows a qualifying person with a landline or flip phone to arrange a trip.

- An existing Lyft Concierge platform such as Go-Go Grandparent, Arrive
 Rides/Silver Ride, or the non-profit, Whistlestop in Marin County is a better
 model for assuring Lyft service to a senior and disabled community. This
 approach will address critical equity and service issues. We strongly recommend
 the City use an existing concierge provider as opposed to outsourcing this piece
 to a yet to be identified non-profit within the City. Also please explain the
 current process for those people using a smartphone.
- The City should also address how it plans to assure the Lyft program is protected from fraud.

3. Outreach and Marketing Plan

<u>Current Status:</u> It was suggested at the City Council meeting on January 29, 2019 that the Lyft program was up and running. However, it became clear at our meeting on February 22, 2019 that no Lyft trips have occurred and that March 1, 2019 is the official start date. Currently registered residents in the R-Transit program may be under the impression that they can receive a smartphone, attend a workshop, and be ready to order on their own using a code, a Lyft trip.

<u>Information Needed:</u> The City should provide more information on the outreach and marketing efforts undertaken to ensure that the public is clear about the timing, eligibility requirements, and other details of the City's program.

- We recommend creating a formal marketing plan, with proposed outreach
 materials to assure a consistent message and to assist other local agencies with
 explaining the program to their residents. We also recommend managing
 expectations and clarifying to residents of the City and the unincorporated areas
 served by the City, exactly what services they can receive.
- Guidelines should include information on how to order trips (with and without a smartphone), where people can/cannot travel, how much of a subsidy they can receive per trip, and how many trips they can order per month. English and Spanish versions of these guidelines should to be created.

4. Performance Monitoring

<u>Current Status:</u> We have heard that there is a monthly reporting process for staff to update the City Council on the R-Transit program. In the past, RouteMatch was the software used for reporting van trips.

Information Needed: At the monthly Council updates, we would like to see consistent performance measures used to report to policy makers. The City needs to address how it will monitor performance of both R-Transit van service as well as Lyft service. What reports will be used to inform revenue hours, non-revenue hours, trip denials and trips delivered for both trips requested within the City as well as to the unincorporated areas served by the City? In the case of Lyft trips, we suggest tracking the daily number of trips, trip origin and destination and total trip cost. Please notify WCCTAC and CCTA staff of the dates that your staff will be presenting to the City Council.

5. Budget

<u>Current Status:</u> The City's program has not received a Measure J allocation since FY-17. Currently, the City's General Funds are covering the entire program

<u>Information Needed:</u> In the past, detailed budgets with information on staffing and personnel expenses have not been required on claim forms; however, due to the substantial changes to the program and the suspension of funds, WCCTAC and CCTA staffs are now requesting a detailed budget.

A budget should include vehicle operating and maintenance expenses, staff
costs (fully burdened rates with benefits), marketing and outreach costs,
projected Lyft fare subsidies, and any contracted concierge support or training
classes for smartphone tech support. If it remains the City's goal to eliminate
City General Funds expenses, the expenditure dollars should equal the amount

of the annual Measure J allocation.

REQUESTED ACTION

Approve the list of projects proposed by the WCCTAC TAC for inclusion in the Regional Transportation Plan and forward to CCTA.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

MTC's Call for Projects for the next Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), known also as Plan Bay Area 2050, was released on March 5, 2019. In response, CCTA directed its staff to begin work with the Regional Transportation Planning Committees (RTPCs) to develop a 30-year project list.

During the RTP update process, MTC works with the Bay Area County Transportation Agencies (CTAs) and project sponsors to update the project list. This list must be limited by the amount of discretionary funding projected to be available during the 30 year period. The projects on the list are not guaranteed funding. Rather, the designation allow projects the ability to pursue certain state and federal funds.

Projects that would increase the capacity of the transportation system and impact air quality, such as new lanes to freeways and roadways, rail extensions, or park-and-ride lots must be included in the RTP. Projects that expect to receive state and/or federal funding or action (e.g. NEPA clearance) must also be included in the RTP.

The following programmatic categories will be included in this RTP. Projects that fall into these categories do not have to be listed individually:

- Pedestrian/Bicycle Projects
- Access and Mobility Programs (e.g. paratransit & school bus pass programs)
- Innovative Transportation Technology (e.g. CV/AV infrastructure)
- County Safety, Security, and Other (grade separations, realignments, etc.)
- Minor Roadway Expansion (non-arterial widening, extensions of roadways)
- Roadway Operations (e.g. intersection improvements)
- Multimodal/Streetscape Projects (e.g. complete street projects)
- Minor Transit Improvements (e.g. maintenance facility expansions, rolling stock)
- BART Capacity, Access and Parking Improvements, & BART Core Capacity

Locally funded projects that do not fit within one of the programmatic categories (outlined in the prior page) need to be added to the list even if they do not anticipate seeking future federal or state funds.

Projects that cannot fit within the financially constrained list can be included on the separate vision list. Should the final fund estimate for Plan Bay Area be higher than currently projected, the Authority can move projects from the vision list to the financially constrained list. MTC will release the final fund estimate in fall 2019 for Plan Bay Area BA 2050.

At its meetings on March 14, 2019 and April 11, 2019, the WCCTAC TAC reviewed projects included in the last RTP, known as Plan Bay Area 2040. They removed projects that are completed, no longer supported, or substantially under construction. They updated cost estimates, project descriptions, committed fund sources, and funding shortfalls. Lastly, they identified key new projects to add to the RTP list.

The attached, financially constrained list, developed by the TAC, includes all of the priority projects in West Contra Costa that may require state or federal funds in the next few years. (based on the TAC's understanding). Given MTC's expected fund estimate, the likely share for Contra Costa County, and an estimated share for West Contra Costa, the fund target for West Costa is \$230M.

The total funding shortfall for projects included on the TAC's financially constrained list is \$315M. However, this difference acceptable to CCTA staff, given some uncertainty about the funds estimate. If the West County list needs to be modified later this year based on funding availability, it can be brought back to the WCCTAC Board for adjustments.

REQUESTED ACTION

Provide any direction to staff, as needed, regarding WCCTAC's interaction with the TEP development process.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

In February, the CCTA Board authorized its staff to begin exploring a Transportation Expenditure Plan (TEP) for a possible sales tax measure. At the April CCTA Board meeting, CCTA staff provided an overview of guiding principles for the development of a TEP and a work program. A possible new measure could be brought to the voters in either March, 2020, for the primary, or November, 2020, for the general election. The Commissioners favor the former and that's now the current working assumption for the schedule.

To gather voter perspectives, CCTA tasked EMC Research with doing public opinion research through focus groups and polling. In the last two months, a focus group was held in each subregion and a youth-aimed forum was also held online. The focus groups were comprised of "swing voters". EMC Research staff provided some conclusions from this work at the Authority's April meeting.

According to the consultant, voters viewed getting around as difficult and wanted improvements, but were skeptical that the problem will be fully "solved" or that there was one obvious thing would make it better. They tended to focus more on outcomes and less on specific projects and, and generally believe that our transportation system is not keeping up. They did not view freeway lane widening as the best solution and focused more on solutions that remove cars from the road altogether. This included faster, more reliable, and more connected transit, and better first mile/last mile connections. The conclusions from the polling research, and more detail about the focus group work, will be provided at the next Authority meeting.

With a schedule that aims for a March 2020 ballot, an initial draft of the TEP would need to be completed by June, 2019. This draft TEP would be developed by a five-member subcommittee of the Commission, comprised of one representative from each sub-region and a representative of the County. The draft would be released for feedback, including to the RTPCs, with a final TEP approval by the Authority scheduled for August, 2019. The final TEP

would circulate to local jurisdictions the fall and in November, 2019 the County would consider an ordinance to place the measure on the ballot.

Given the tight schedule and the small window of opportunity for WCCTAC to provide input, the Board should consider how it would like to prepare for, and engage with, the TEP development process.

Background

Since 1989, the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (Authority) has administered sales tax revenues collected through voter-approved transportation improvement funding measures, Measures C and J. Measure C, passed in 1988, created a half-cent sales tax for 20 years, expiring in 2009. In 2004, Contra Costa County voters approved Measure J, with a 71.1 percent vote, to continue the half-cent transportation sales tax for an additional 25 years (beyond the original 2009 expiration date). Together, the two measures will generate more than \$3.7 billion in local sales tax funds.

The projects and programs that are advanced with these funds are defined in a TEP that was approved by the Authority and included with the ballot measures. The TEP is a critical component of gaining approval of a local transportation revenue source, as it clearly defines what benefits will be received if the electorate approves a local sales tax measure. The TEP also allows the Authority to include details of policy provisions that will be used in the implementation such as transparency and accountability, priorities for leveraging other fund sources, and the Growth Management Program (GMP) including the Urban Limit Line (ULL), and other policies.

Measure J includes "pay-as-you-go" program components consisting of maintenance, operations, and local projects related to small infrastructure improvements. Together, these represent approximately 58 percent of the overall Measure J revenue that will fund defined program improvements (i.e. Local Streets Maintenance & Improvements (LSM), Bus Services, Transportation for Seniors & People with Disabilities, Safe Transportation for Children, Pedestrian, Bicycle & Trail Facilities (PBTF), and Transportation for Livable Communities (TLC)) through the end of the current Measure J half-cent transportation sales tax in 2034.

The remaining Measure J funds, approximately 42 percent, were dedicated to construction of major projects such as the Caldecott Tunnel, Highway 4 widening and the Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) extension to Antioch, improvements to the Interstate 680 (I-680)/Highway 4 Interchange, and others. A majority of the major capital projects in Measure J are either under construction or completed. Using accelerated delivery strategies, enabled the Authority to deliver the projects to the public quickly and efficiently. In addition, the Authority's policy that allows bonding against future project revenues has helped accelerate project delivery. An outcome of the Authority's aggressive capital delivery strategy is that Measure J funds available for major capital projects have been expended or committed.

To continue to implement a robust capital program to improve the transportation network in Contra Costa, and to enhance or add new services, additional new revenue is required. Over the last two decades, local funds have become a major factor in the funding and delivery of transportation improvements. Development and approval of a new TEP and an associated countywide transportation sales tax measure is one method to begin addressing the funding gap.

At its February 2019 Authority Board meeting, the Authority authorized staff to begin exploring development of a new TEP and conduct public opinion research, propose guiding principles, and prepare a work plan, schedule and cost estimate for development of a new TEP.

Guiding Principles for Development of a Transportation Expenditure Plan (TEP)

An initial step in developing a new TEP is to adopt Guiding Principles for Development of a TEP (Principles). Development of a new TEP should be guided by principles that build on the Mission, Vision, and Goals, and embrace the values of collaboration between the Authority and its partner agencies. Development of a new TEP will require technical, political, public and stakeholder outreach. The Principles will help guide the Authority through the regional, stakeholder, and public outreach and TEP development process.

The proposed Principles include supporting the vision and goals for a new TEP as follows: to ease traffic congestion; make public transportation more accessible; optimize the transportation system; improve air quality, create jobs, generate economic benefits; repave local streets, repair potholes, and synchronize signals. (See Attachment A).

Process for Developing a New Transportation Expenditure Plan (TEP)

Authority staff has developed a TEP Work Plan outlining the outreach plan, stakeholder outreach, public outreach, regional outreach and input, TEP development, and the schedule. Developing a new TEP is a lengthy process that will require a significant level of regional, stakeholder and public outreach. In Attachment B, an Outreach Plan graphic has been developed to show the general flow of information among the participants involved in the development of a new TEP.

The Authority could consider placing a TEP on the March 2020 or November 2020 ballot. For the March 2020 ballot, staff estimates that the process would take about six months and the process would have to begin now. For the November 2020 ballot, staff estimates that process would take about 12 months providing additional time to prepare a new TEP. In Attachment B, the TEP Work Plan outlines sample schedules for placing a new TEP on the March 2020 or November 2020 ballot.

To develop a TEP, Authority staff will review other recently approved measures such as Regional Measure 3 (RM3) and Senate Bill 1 (SB1), emerging trends for balancing flexibility and accountability, investing for new mobility solutions, planning for emerging technologies, and maximizing fund leveraging opportunities.

Regarding committee structure, the Authority could consider the creation of an Ad Hoc TEP Committee to guide the development and approve the TEP on behalf of the Authority. The Ad Hoc TEP Committee can be a "committee of the whole".

Public Opinion Research Update

At its February 2019 Authority Board meeting, the Authority directed staff to conduct public opinion research concurrently with the development of a TEP Work Plan. On behalf of the Authority, EMC Research completed initial research that consisted of focus groups conducted in each of the four sub-regions in Contra Costa County. Staff will present the initial research conducted to date at the meeting.

Next Steps

Based on discussion and input, staff will return in May with a recommended TEP process and schedule for consideration by the Authority.

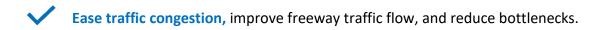

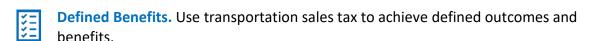

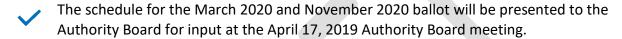

TEP Development

The Authority could create an Ad-Hoc TEP Committee to guide the development and approve a TEP. An initial draft TEP will be presented to the Authority Board for consideration and input. After input is received on the initial draft TEP, Authority staff and other designated individuals will seek regional input into the draft TEP through outreach efforts including presentations to Cities, County, RTPC's, PMA, Transit Operators and Stakeholders. A final TEP will be presented to the Authority Board in August 2019 for consideration and approval.
- Consultant Assistance | Consultant resources will be used to support Authority staff efforts for development of the work plan, schedules and budget; informational materials, technical support for project and programs costs and schedules, presentations, and administrative tasks.
- 3 Updates to Transportation Needs and Funding Outlook | The Authority will update the 2016 TEP and prepare an initial draft TEP based on unfunded transportation needs, focus group and survey data received in April/May 2019, and anticipated funding amounts of recently approved transportation funding programs such as Senate Bill 1 (SB1), Regional Measure 3 (RM3), etc.

TEP Strategies | Authority staff will review other recently approved TEPs, emerging trends for balancing flexibility and accountability, investing for new mobility solutions, planning for emerging technologies, and maximizing funding leverage opportunities. 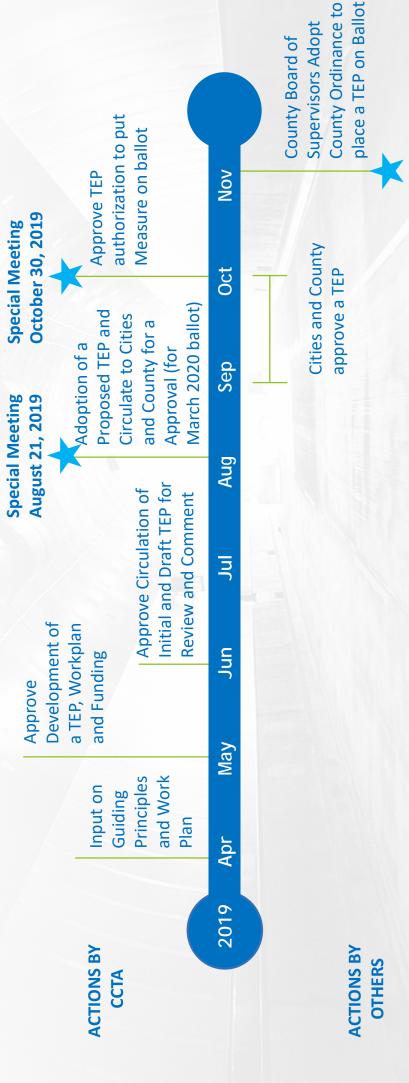

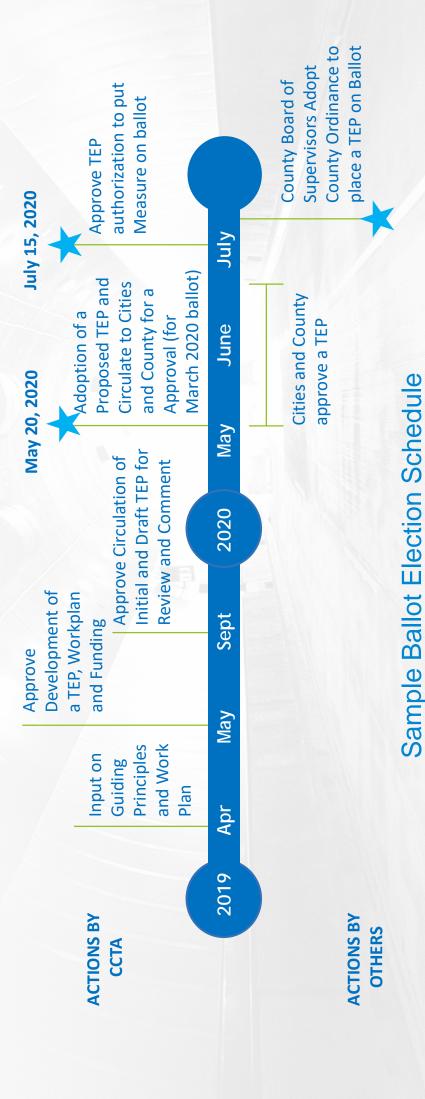
